## 2. Students (and their welfare)

- General characteristics
  - R – 6 school comprises 13 classes – 6 JP and 7 Primary.
- Student well-being programs
  - Play is the Way is a school wide social skills program.
  - The Wellbeing Coordinator and Pastoral Support Worker work both individually and with small groups of students who require support with wellbeing &/or social skills.
- Student support offered
  - SSO support is provided for all students with a disability.
  - Other students are provided with support through 1:1 and small group instruction for academic and social/emotional needs and reading intervention (i.e., Phonics Intervention, Maths Intervention and Speech Programmes).
- Student management
  - The SBM policy is based on the school values, Restorative Practices and Games Factory philosophies. We link our teaching to the Personal and Social Capabilities
- Student government
  - The Principal oversees the student leaders in the school.

Student leaders are part of small groups that oversee a direction that students nominate and coordinate.

Student Voice operates throughout the school as we strongly believe that students should be the change agents from within the school setting and the curriculum development.

### **3. Key School Policies**

Using domain 2 in TfEL to create safe conditions for learning is our primary focus. Develop democratic relationships to ensure that students have a strong voice in the curriculum development is vital as we ensure that learning is negotiated. We also believe that the teaching of the Personal and Social Capabilities will provide our students with skill sthat will dramatically reduce behaviour and provide them with liflong skills. Teaching of Critical and Creative thinking allows students to be lifelong learners. We connect 6 curriculum areas (Science, HPE, HASS, Languages and Technology) to enable an interdisciplinary curriculum that is relevant and engaging to students.

### **4. Curriculum**

- Subject offerings: All learning areas consistent with the Australian Curriculum and the South Australian Curriclum and Accountability framework.

- Special needs: Negotiated Education Plans (NEPs) are updated twice a year for all students with a disability.
- Student assessment procedures and reporting: The school provides written reports to parents/caregivers twice a year (Term 2 & 4), in Term 1 and 3, 3-way conferences are held for all students.

## 11. Local Community

- General characteristics

Stirling North is a growth area for privately owned new homes because of its semi-rural setting.

There is strong community interest in a range of sporting and recreational activities.

The school provides a focal point for the community and generally receives good community support for activities and fundraising ventures.

The community's close proximity to Port Augusta ensures access to a wide range of retail, sporting, health and entertainment facilities.

Port Augusta is known as the "*Crossroads of Australia*" and the Gateway to the Flinders Ranges, the Outback and Spencer Gulf.

Port Augusta is situated on the quiet waterways at the head of the Spencer Gulf, in close proximity to the spectacular Flinders Ranges.

Population of approximately 15000.



Port Augusta provides reasonable opportunities for employment in a range of industries, government agencies and commercial enterprises. Some residents commute further afield to work on mining sites regionally and interstate.

There are numerous sporting and recreational facilities available in Port Augusta.

There are numerous pubs, restaurants, and take-away outlets.

There is a public library.

A range of tourist attractions (including Wadlata and Arid Lands).
