

## A note from Principal, Adam Wilson

#### What is Creativity?

Ask any manager, business owner or CEO and a key feature that they want their employees to have is *creativity*. The ability to think for themselves and to solve problems that arise. I'm convinced that education has not had this as a priority for the last 50 years. In fact, there has been a large amount of emphasis on students learning new things, rather than solving problems. Reflect back on your own schooling experience and the teacher had all the information, and you needed to learn it. With technology, and even Artificial Intelligence, the ability to get information quickly is no longer a problem. For example, have you ever been to a BBQ and someone asks you a question about a past event and you don't know it. What is the first thing that you do? Grab your phone and Google it... Information is now acquired instantly. I'm not suggesting that new knowledge is not important and should not be taught in schools... but should it be the only things that schools continue to do?

At SNPS we teach Creativity via 6 sub headings. This has been heavily researched by Bill Lucas and features in a book - Teaching Creative Thinking.

Inquisitive - The ability to ask questions, investigate and speculate

Collaborative - The ability to share, discuss and explain your point of view with others

Persistent - The ability to show resilience by repeating, reviewing and persevering with new learning

Disciplined - The ability to reflect, modify and improve new learning

Imaginative - The ability to invent, create and connect new products

Empathetic - The ability to listen, reflect and support

I'm sure you'll agree that each of these skills are important in the world we are currently living in. The true value of these skills is that they are uniquely 'human' skills that cannot be replaced by Artificial Intelligence or robots. At SNPS, we are proud to foster creativity as a distinctly human ability and an essential part of how we prepare students for the future.

#### **Generational learning**

I am so proud of so many learning opportunities that are provided for our students. See the information about creativity above to see its value...

But one initiative that the Year 3 classes have been doing all year has been regular visits with Wami Kata and Ramsay Village nursing homes. Over the past 3 Terms students have visited the elderly every fortnight to develop and build strong relationships with the residents. One of their goals was to entertain the residents and they did this by creating games to play with them. They shared their games with the year 5/6 classes prior to visiting the residents and received some really helpful feedback to improve.

I also want to take this opportunity to thank Lisa Jarret from the Stirling North Markets as well as the Port Augusta City Council for their kind donations to fund the transport and materials for the students to use for these fortnightly visits. This funding is invaluable and once again demonstrates the amazing community support that we get to have such initiatives occur for our students.







## **National Champions**










#### The Back Page Sports Report



A few weeks ago, six of our students proudly represented Northern SAPSASA at the State Country Boys Soccer Championships. Over three days, the team played three matches each day, finishing the carnival with eight wins and one draw to secure first place overall. Coached by Mr Robinson, our photo features Mikey, Taylan, Levi, Blake, Carter and Jenson proudly holding their medals and championship pennant.



Recently, our school hosted the annual Northern SAPSASA District Sports Day, with nine schools taking part. Stirling North was represented by 50 students, competing across four age groups in a range of running and field events. At the end of the day, the top five results were: SNPS 389 points, Caritas 341, PAWPS 265, APPS 111 and FVPS 53. Every one of our students contributed to the final score, making it a true team effort and securing the win for Stirling North.









On the day, seven of our students set new records. Harrison N broke the 9-year boys 200m record with a time of 35.45 seconds. Joe N set a new mark in the 10-year boys 100m, finishing in 15.06 seconds. Emily K achieved a record throw of 8.79m in the 12-year girls 3kg shot put. In addition, Liam L, Lucas K, Mark C and Riley A combined to set a new record in the 12-year boys 4x100m relay with a time of 1:02.99.
